Zinc: The Catalyst

Zinc is another critical cofactor for thyroid hormone synthesis. Without it, your body struggles to produce sufficient T4 and T3 signals. Zinc also helps regulate the release of thyroid-stimulating hormone (TSH) from the pituitary gland. Oysters are the richest source, but zinc can also be found in beef, pumpkin seeds, chickpeas, and cashews. For those on a plant-based diet, focusing on legumes and seeds is particularly important.

Iron: For Effective Utilization

Iron deficiency is common in people with hypothyroidism, particularly in women. Iron is required for the activity of thyroid peroxidase (TPO), an enzyme critical for the formation of thyroid hormones. Without enough iron, the thyroid cannot use iodine efficiently. However, for most people with adequate iodine intake and when these vegetables are cooked, they are perfectly safe and highly beneficial due to their fiber and nutrient content.

Healthy Fats and Gut-Friendly Foods

A healthy gut microbiome is increasingly recognized as crucial for proper thyroid function. The conversion of T4 to T3 actually occurs partly in the gut. Fermented foods like yogurt, kefir, sauerkraut, and kimchi support a healthy gut ecosystem. Healthy

fats from avocados, olive oil, and nuts also help reduce systemic inflammation.

FOODS AND SUBSTANCES TO LIMIT OR AVOID

Just as some foods support the thyroid, others can hinder its function. When designing a diet to improve thyroid function, being mindful of these potential disruptors is important.

Processed Foods and Sugars

Gluten for Autoimmune Conditions

In many individuals with Hashimoto's, gluten can trigger an immune response that may cross-react with thyroid tissue, worsening the condition. While not everyone with hypothyroidism needs to eliminate gluten, a trial period of a gluten-free diet (for at least 4-6 weeks) can be a worthwhile experiment for those with Hashimoto's to see if symptoms improve.

Excessive Caffeine and Alcohol

Caffeine can interfere with the absorption of thyroid medication; it is best to wait at least 30-60 minutes after taking medication before having coffee or tea. Alcohol can be toxic to the thyroid gland and can impair its ability to produce hormones. Moderate consumption is key, and for some, eliminating alcohol may be beneficial during the initial stages of healing the thyroid.

A SAMPLE DAY ON A THYROID-SUPPORTIVE DIET
