# Regional and Slang Variations

France and other French-speaking regions have their own local twists. In the south of France, you might hear **adieu** used historically, though now it mostly means "goodbye." # Adding Politeness: Comment allez- vous?

After you say hi, it is natural to ask how someone is. In formal situations, use **Comment allez-vous?** (How are you?). In informal settings, **Comment ça va?** or simply **Ça va?** works. The standard response is **Bien, merci** (Fine, thanks) or **Ça va bien** (It's going well). This exchange is so ingrained that even a brief **Salut, ça va?** with a nod is enough to acknowledge each other.

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## TIME OF DAY GREETINGS: MORE THAN JUST BONJOUR

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French also has specific greetings for different times. **Bon matin** is used in Quebec (and some parts of France) to mean "good morning," though in standard French, **bonjour** is used all day. **Bonne journée** (have a good day) is a farewell, not a greeting.
