Healthy Fats for Absorption

Your body needs healthy fats to absorb fat-soluble vitamins (A, D, E, K) and to build cell membranes. Avocado, olive oil, nuts, seeds, and fatty fish like salmon provide omega-3 fatty acids that reduce inflammation and support cell regeneration.
