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## SEASON 2: THE RISE OF THE NEW KING (2014)

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Season 2 moves beyond Piper's perspective. While she faces the fallout of her actions and a new rival, the season is largely defined by the introduction of one of television's greatest villains: Vee (Lorraine Toussaint).

## Major Plot Points

Vee, a former crime boss and Red's old frenemy, arrives at Litchfield and systematically dismantles the existing social order. She manipulates younger inmates like Taystee (Danielle Brooks)

**(Episode 12):** The birth of Daya's baby is a harrowing, tense, and darkly funny sequence that shows the absolute failure of the medical system under private management.

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## **SEASON 4: THE TIPPING POINT (2016)**

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Season 4 is widely considered the show's peak. The tensions of private ownership and increased violence come to a head.
