It is critical to approach fuses related to the airbag system with extreme caution. Working on these circuits without disconnecting the battery can potentially cause an accidental deployment. Always consult the diagram and follow proper safety procedures.

Identifying a Blown Fuse

Why Fuses Blow Repeatedly
