
How To Rebuild A Small Block Chevy

- A shop crane or engine hoist to remove and install the engine.

Precision Measuring Tools

- Inside and outside micrometers.
- A dial bore gauge for measuring cylinder taper and out-of-round.
- Plastigage for checking bearing clearances.
- A degree wheel and dial indicator for camshaft timing.
- A feeler gauge set.

Specialized Rebuilding Tools

- A piston ring compressor.
- Valve spring compressor (for removing and installing valve springs).
- A ridge reamer (to remove the carbon ridge at the top of the cylinder before removing pistons).
- Engine assembly lubricant (moly paste for cam lobes, assembly lube for bearings).

PHASE ONE: DISASSEMBLY AND INITIAL INSPECTION

The first step in learning **how to rebuild a small block Chevy** is taking it apart systematically. Do not just tear into it without a plan. Organization is critical.

Removing the Engine

If the engine is still in the vehicle, drain the coolant and oil. Disconnect the battery, remove the radiator, and unbolt the transmission from the engine block. They have worn into a specific pattern with their respective lobes and should ideally return to the same position if you are reusing them (though you likely will not). Once the heads are off, remove the oil pan, oil pump, and timing cover. Finally, remove the connecting rod caps and push the pistons out of the top of the cylinder bore. Remove the main bearing caps and lift out the crankshaft.

The Critical Inspection

Before you order any parts, you need to know what you are working with. Look for obvious damage like cracked cylinder

walls or spun bearings. Measure the cylinder bores for taper and out-of-round. Check the crankshaft journals for scoring. This inspection will tell you if your block needs to be bored oversize or if the crank needs to be ground. This is the moment where your project budget and direction are determined.

PHASE TWO: CLEANING AND MACHINING

You cannot rebuild a dirty engine. Once the block is stripped of all components, it must be thoroughly cleaned. If you have a local machine shop, this is the time to build a relationship with them. They have hot tanks and ultrasonic cleaners that will remove every trace of oil, grease, and carbon from the block, heads, and crankshaft.

Machine Work to Consider

Most rebuilds require some level of machine work. If the cylinder bores are worn or out of round, the block will need to be bored and honed to the next oversize piston. The decks of the block (where the cylinder heads mate) may need to be squared up to ensure a perfect head gasket seal. The connecting rods should be resized, and the crankshaft journals should be polished or ground undersize. Having a professional machine shop handle these tasks is the best way to ensure your engine has the correct clearances when you begin assembly. This step is the foundation of a successful rebuild.

PHASE THREE: ASSEMBLY - PUTTING IT ALL BACK TOGETHER

This is the most rewarding part of

learning **how to rebuild a small block Chevy**. Cleanliness is now absolute. Even a single grain of sand can ruin a bearing. Wash the block one more time with soap and water, then blow it dry with compressed air. Oil all bearing surfaces immediately to prevent rust.

Step 1: Install the Main Bearings and Crankshaft

Lay the upper main bearing inserts into the block. Ensure the tangs lock into the grooves. Lubricate the bearings with assembly lube. Carefully lower the crankshaft into place. Install the lower bearing inserts into the main caps, lubricate them, and install the caps. Torque the main cap bolts to the correct specification in the proper sequence. Check the crankshaft end-play with a feeler gauge. This clearance is critical for longevity.

Step 2: Install the Pistons and Connecting Rods

Install the piston rings onto the pistons, staggering the ring gaps according to the manufacturer's instructions. Lubricate the cylinder walls and the piston skirts. Compress the rings with a ring compressor and gently tap the piston into the cylinder with the handle of a hammer. Guide the connecting rod onto the crankshaft journal and install

the rod cap. Torque the rod bolts to specification. Repeat for all eight cylinders. This step requires patience to avoid breaking a ring.

Step 3: Install the Camshaft and Timing Set

Lubricate the camshaft lobes heavily with moly assembly lube. This is the most critical lubrication point in the engine. Slowly slide the camshaft into the block, being careful not to damage the cam bearings. Install the timing chain and gears, aligning the marks on the cam and crank sprockets. This ensures the engine is in time. Install the timing cover and a new front seal.

Step 4: Oil Pump and Oil Pan

Prime the oil pump by packing it with petroleum jelly. Install the pump and the pickup tube. Set the oil pan gasket and install the oil pan. Torque the pan bolts to a light specification to avoid warping the pan rail.

Step 5: Cylinder Head Assembly and Installation

If you had machine work done, the heads should already be assembled with new valves, springs, and seals. Install the head gaskets (check for correct orientation) and place the cylinder heads

onto the block. Install the head bolts and torque them in the correct sequence to the manufacturer's specification. This is usually done in three stages.

Step 6: Valvetrain and Intake Manifold

Install the pushrods and rocker arms. Adjust the valve lash according to the camshaft manufacturer's specifications. Install the intake manifold with a new gasket set, being careful to apply sealant at the front and rear china walls of the block. Torque the intake bolts in a crisscross pattern from the center outward.

Step 7: Final External Assembly

Install the water pump, harmonic balancer, flywheel or flexplate, and new spark plugs. Bolt on the distributor, timing it so the rotor points to the number one cylinder terminal. Install the valve covers and any other accessory brackets you removed.

BREAKING IN YOUR NEWLY REBUILT SMALL BLOCK CHEVY

The work is not over once the engine is back in the vehicle. The break-in procedure is the final step in **how to rebuild a small block Chevy** successfully. Start the engine and immediately bring the RPM to around 2000. Do not let it idle. Run it at this

speed for 20 minutes to properly break in the camshaft lobes. Check for oil pressure, coolant leaks, and unusual noises. After the break-in period, change the oil and filter to remove any assembly debris. Retorque the head bolts and adjust the valves one final time.

COMMON PITFALLS TO AVOID DURING AN SBC REBUILD

1. **Skipping the machine shop inspection:** Assuming the block is square will lead to blown head gaskets and oil leaks.
2. **Insufficient camshaft lubrication:** The number one cause of camshaft failure in a new rebuild is a dry camshaft at startup.
3. **Incorrect bearing clearances:** Always use Plastigage to verify clearances, even with new parts.
4. **Rushing the assembly:** Take your time. Double-check every torque spec.
5. **Forgetting the assembly lube:**

Never assemble bearings or cam lobes dry.
