For a new teacher, your education is often your strongest asset. Place this section high on your resume, typically right after your professional summary. List your most recent degree first.

- **Degree:** Include the full name of your degree (e.g., Bachelor of Science in Elementary Education).
- **Institution:** Name of the university or college.
- **Graduation Date:** Month and year.
- **GPA (Optional):** If you graduated with a GPA of 3.5 or higher, include it. This is a concrete achievement that adds weight to a teaching resume for new teacher applicants.
- **Relevant Coursework (Optional):** List a few key courses that are directly relevant to the jobs you are applying for, such as "Classroom Management," "Educational Psychology," or "Teaching English Language Learners."

Student Teaching

Other Relevant Experience
