3. **Open-Response (simplified):** A student computes the sum of $\frac{1}{2}$ and $\frac{2}{3}$ as $\frac{3}{5}$. Describe the error and provide a correct explanation for adding fractions with unlike denominators.
Explanation: The student incorrectly added numerators and denominators directly. To add fractions, you must first find

a common denominator. For $\frac{1}{2}$ and $\frac{2}{3}$, the least common denominator is 6. Rewrite: $\frac{1}{2} = \frac{3}{6}$ and $\frac{2}{3} = \frac{4}{6}$, then add to get $\frac{7}{6}$ or $1 \frac{1}{6}$. A good open-response answer would also include a visual model or real-world context.
