## 4. Salutation (Greeting)

The salutation is the greeting that opens the letter. When you **list the parts of a business letter**, the salutation typically begins with "Dear" followed by the recipient's title and last name, and then a colon (not a comma). For example: "Dear Mr. Johnson:" or "Dear Dr. Lee:". If you do not know the recipient's

Including a subject line helps the recipient quickly grasp the letter's focus and file it appropriately.

The body is the core of your message. It usually consists of three parts: an introductory paragraph, one or more supporting paragraphs, and a concluding paragraph. ## Complimentary Close

## 8. Signature Block

After the complimentary close, leave about four blank lines (for a handwritten signature) and then type your full name. Below your name, include your job title and company name (if applicable). This is called the signature block. It is a crucial part when you **list the parts of a business letter** because it authenticates the document.

If you are sending the letter via email, you may still include a typed signature with contact details.

## 9. Enclosure Notation (If Applicable)

## 10. Copy Notation (CC)

When you send copies of the letter to other people, use “cc” (carbon copy) followed by the names of those recipients. Place this below the enclosure notation. For example: “cc: Jane Smith, Legal Department.” This is common in business correspondence to keep stakeholders informed. ## Postscript (P.S.) – Rarely Used

A postscript is an afterthought added at the very end of the letter. In formal business letters, a P.S. is rarely appropriate because it can make the letter seem disorganized. However, in some sales letters or less formal business contexts, a P.S. can be used to emphasize a key point. Use it sparingly and only if necessary.
