

# How To Get Iphone Emojis On Android

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## INTRODUCTION: WHY YOU MIGHT WANT IPHONE EMOJIS ON YOUR ANDROID DEVICE

Emojis have become a universal language in digital communication, adding emotion, tone, and personality to text messages, social media posts, and emails. While both Apple and Google offer extensive emoji libraries, the specific designs vary significantly between platforms. Many Android users find themselves envying the look of Apple’s emojis, which often appear more polished, expressive, or simply different from the default Android emoji set. Whether you’re a fan of the iconic Apple smiley faces, the detailed food and animal icons, or the sleek human figures, the desire to use iPhone emojis on an Android device is common. Fortunately, you don’t need to switch to an iPhone to enjoy those familiar designs. This article provides a comprehensive, step-by-step guide on how to get iPhone emojis on Android, covering multiple methods—from simple keyboard replacements to root-level modifications. Each method has its own level of difficulty, compatibility, and permanence, so you can choose the one that best suits your needs and technical comfort.

## UNDERSTANDING THE DIFFERENCE: IOS VS. ANDROID EMOJI STYLES

Before diving into the “how,” it’s helpful to understand why iPhone emojis look different. Apple designs its emoji set with a distinctive three-dimensional, glossy style, often using more shading and detail. Google’s Android emojis, starting with Android 8.0 (Oreo), adopted a more flat, cartoonish blob-like style, which later evolved into a more rounded and simplistic design. The Unicode Consortium defines the official emoji characters, but each platform creates its own graphic interpretation. This means that an emoji for “smiling face with heart-eyes” has a different visual representation on iPhone compared to most Android phones. When you send an emoji from an iPhone to an Android, the Android device will display its own version, not the Apple one. To actually see and use iPhone-style emojis on your Android, you need to change the emoji font or the keyboard app that supplies the emoji graphics.

## METHOD 1: USE A THIRD-PARTY KEYBOARD WITH IOS EMOJIS

The easiest and most user-friendly way to get iPhone emojis on Android is by installing a third-party keyboard app that includes Apple-style emoji designs. These apps replace your default keyboard and provide a new set of emojis that look just like those on an iPhone. No root access is required, and the process takes only a few minutes.

# Recommended Keyboard Apps

- **Gboard (Google Keyboard) - but with a trick:** Surprisingly, Google’s own Gboard can display iOS-style emojis if you change a specific setting. Open Gboard settings, go to “Preferences,” then “Emoji style,” and select “iOS.” This option may not appear on all devices or versions, so it’s worth checking first.
- **SwiftKey:** Microsoft’s SwiftKey does not natively offer iOS emojis, but through its Themes and Emoji settings, you can sometimes choose “iOS Emoji” from the emoji style menu (available in newer versions).
- **Specialized iOS Emoji Keyboards:** Apps like “Emoji Keyboard - iOS Emojis for Android” or “iOS Emoji Keyboard” are designed specifically to mimic Apple’s emoji set. Search the Google Play Store with terms like “iOS emoji keyboard” and look for apps with high ratings and recent updates.

# How to Install and Enable a Keyboard App

1. Go to the Google Play Store and download an iOS emoji keyboard app of your choice.
2. Open the app and follow the setup instructions. Most will prompt you to enable the keyboard in your system settings.
3. Go to **Settings > System > Languages & input > On-screen keyboard > Manage keyboards**.
4. Toggle on the newly installed keyboard app.
5. Open any messaging app, tap the keyboard icon (usually near the space bar), and select the new keyboard.
6. Start typing and access the emoji picker – you should now see iPhone-style emojis.

**Pros:** No root, easy to switch between keyboards, reversible. **Cons:** Emojis only appear within that keyboard app; other parts of the system (like notifications or quick setting icons) still use the default Android emojis. Also, some apps may not display your typed emojis as iOS style when sent to other users; they convert to standard Unicode emojis on the recipient’s device.

# Important Note on Emoji Sending

While you can see iPhone emojis on your own screen, when you send an emoji to someone who uses a different platform, the recipient will see the emoji from their own device’s font. The keyboard only changes what you see on your end. This is a crucial point: the method does not change the underlying Unicode character; it only alters the visual representation locally.

## METHOD 2: USE AN APP THAT REPLACES YOUR SYSTEM EMOJI FONT

If you want iPhone emojis to appear everywhere on your Android device—not just in the keyboard—you need to replace the system emoji font. This is a more advanced method that modifies the system font files. It typically requires a rooted device or using a specific app that can swap fonts without root (on some devices).

# Using “Emoji Font Manager” Apps (No Root Required on Some Phones)

Certain Android skins, especially from Samsung or Xiaomi, allow users to change system fonts via theme stores. However, for pure emoji font replacement, apps like “Emoji Font Installer” (by Ramtin) or “Emoji Switcher” (by TAPUNIVERSE) can replace the emoji font file without root,

provided you are on Android 10 or earlier (on newer Android versions, the system font partition is protected). These apps download an iOS emoji font (usually a TTF file) and apply it system-wide.

1. Download a font replacement app from the Play Store. Read descriptions carefully to ensure it supports your device.
2. Grant necessary permissions (storage, accessibility, or root if required).
3. Search for and download the iOS emoji font package within the app.
4. Apply the font – the app will replace the system emoji font with the iOS version.
5. Reboot your device if prompted.

**Warning:** This method can cause instability if the font is incompatible. Always back up your original emoji font before proceeding. On Android 11 and above, system font replacement is heavily restricted without root. Some apps use a workaround with subprocesses, but results vary.

# Root Method: Manual Replacement

If your phone is rooted, you have more control. You can manually replace the emoji font file (usually /system/fonts/NotoColorEmoji.ttf or /system/fonts/NotoEmoji.ttf) with an iOS emoji font file. Here’s a high-level overview:

1. Download an iOS emoji font .ttf file (search for “Apple Color Emoji.ttf” or similar).
2. Use a root file explorer (like Solid Explorer or MiXplorer) to navigate to the system font directory.
3. Back up the original emoji font file to a safe location.
4. Copy the iOS emoji font into the system/fonts folder, rename it to match the original filename (e.g., NotoColorEmoji.ttf), and set permissions to 644.
5. Reboot your device.

**Pros:** iPhone emojis appear everywhere on your phone (keyboard, notifications, apps). **Cons:** Requires root, possible boot loop if wrong font, voids warranty (and may fail SafetyNet/banking apps).

## METHOD 3: USE CUSTOM ROMS OR MAGISK MODULES (ADVANCED)

For rooted users with a custom recovery, you can flash a Magisk module or a custom ROM that includes iOS emojis by default. Magisk modules like “iOS Emoji” are popular and allow systemless installation, meaning they don’t actually modify the system partition but overlay the font. This method keeps your device certified for Google Pay and banking apps (if using MagiskHide).

1. Install Magisk on your rooted device.
2. Search for “iOS Emoji” in the Magisk modules repository (or download a module from XDA Developers).
3. Install the module via Magisk Manager.
4. Reboot.

Alternatively, some custom ROMs (like Pixel Experience or LineageOS) have add-on a packages to change emoji style. This is the most stable method for rooted users who want system-wide changes without manual file editing.

## METHOD 4: USE AN EMOJI SUBSTITUTION APP (WORKAROUND)

If you are hesitant to change system fonts and a keyboard-only solution isn’t enough, consider using an app that automatically substitutes emoji characters in your messages. These apps run in the background and replace the emoji Unicode with images from the iOS set. However, they often break in apps that don’t support overlay or require accessibility services. This method is less reliable and not recommended for daily use, but it exists as a last resort.

## COMPARING THE METHODS: WHICH ONE IS RIGHT FOR YOU?

## TIPS FOR A SUCCESSFUL EMOJI REPLACEMENT

- **Back up your original emoji font** before any system-level change. This is critical to restore if something goes wrong.
- **Check compatibility:** Some iOS emoji fonts may not include all the latest Unicode emojis. Look for an updated font file that matches the current iOS version.
- **Be aware of regional variations:** Apple updates its emoji set with each major iOS release. You may need to reapply the font after an Android system update.
- **Understand limitations:** Even with a system-wide replacement, apps that use their own emoji renderer (like certain social media apps or games) may still show the default Android emojis.
- **Respect app policies:** Some banking or secure apps may detect root or system modifications and refuse to run. Consider this before rooting solely for emojis.

## FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

## Will my friends see iPhone emojis if I send them from my Android?

No. The emoji you send is a Unicode character. The recipient's device uses its own emoji font to render it. If your friend has an iPhone, they will see the Apple version; if they have a Samsung, they will see the Samsung version. Your local replacement only changes what you see on your screen.

## Does changing emoji font affect battery life or performance?

No. Emoji fonts are small static files. They don't impact performance or battery life in any noticeable way.

## Can I use iOS emojis without rooting on Android 12 or 13?

It is difficult. Android 11+ introduced stricter protections on font modifications. Some apps claim to work, but success rates are low. The safest route is a keyboard app that implements iOS designs in its own emoji picker.

## Are there any legal issues with using Apple's emoji designs?

The emoji fonts distributed in these methods are usually extracted from iOS devices. Apple retains the copyright to its emoji artwork. Using them for personal, non-commercial purposes is generally considered acceptable, but distributing the font files publicly could infringe on Apple's intellectual property. Download only from reputable sources that have obtained proper
