WHAT DETERMINES THE PRICE OF A GI JOE ACTION FIGURE?

Condition Is King

Character Popularity

Iconic characters consistently hold higher values. Snake Eyes, Storm Shadow, Cobra Commander, Destro, and Scarlett are perennial favorites. Even if a rare background character exists, a mint-condition Snake Eyes will often outperform it in price because of high demand.
