Over the strip's decades-long run, these characters aged, changed careers, found and lost love, had children, experienced illness, and grieved. While the test has its limitations and has been frequently critiqued, its power lies in its stark simplicity. It forces audiences and critics to notice how often women are absent from their own stories or are only present as accessories to male narratives. The Bechdel Test is a testament to the sharp observational humor and cultural criticism that were the hallmarks of **Dykes To Watch Out For**. It is arguably the strip's most famous contribution to popular culture, a single panel that sparked a global conversation about representation in storytelling.

The Later Years and the Final Chapter

After a 25-year run, Alison Bechdel brought **Dykes To Watch Out For** to a close in 2008. The decision was not born of creative exhaustion but of a natural conclusion. The cultural landscape had shifted dramatically since the strip's inception. The "post-gay" era had arrived, and the urgency of simply representing lesbian existence had, in some ways, lessened. Furthermore, Bechdel was turning her attention to a new project: a deeply personal graphic memoir about her relationship with her father, which would become the acclaimed *Fun Home*.

The final storylines offered a sense of closure for the characters while acknowledging that life, and the work of social justice, continues. The last panel of the final strip shows Mo sitting in her garden, a place of quiet resilience and personal peace. It was a fitting end for a strip that had always balanced the fight for a better world with the simple, profound need for a life of one's own. The series concluded with a masterful collection, *The Essential Dykes To Watch Out For*, which remains the definitive volume for newcomers and longtime fans alike.

The Lasting Influence on Queer Comics and Media
