A crucial point Wilber makes is that the very act of trying to achieve a "no boundary" state can be counterproductive. If you think of the no boundary state as a *goal* to be attained by your current self, you are reinforcing the very boundary you seek to dissolve. The ego cannot achieve nonduality; it can only surrender into it. The journey is not about adding something new to yourself, but about unlearning the false limitations you have imposed upon yourself.
