### A STRATEGIC APPROACH TO SOLVING THE CHALLENGE

- Work with Linear Pairs and Vertical Angles:** Many angles in the diagram will be adjacent to each other. Use the fact that a straight line forms 180 degrees. If you solve for one angle, you instantly know its supplement. Similarly, vertical angles (angles opposite each other when two lines cross) are always equal. This is a quick way to transfer information across the diagram.
- Apply the Intersecting Chords Theorem:** When two chords cross inside the circle, use the formula  $(Arcs1 + Arc2)/2 = Angle$ . If you know two arcs, find the angle. If you know the angle and one arc, find the other arc. This is a very common step in **The Giant Circle Challenge**.
- Use the Secant-Tangent Theorem:** For angles formed outside the circle, the formula is  $(Far Arc - Near Arc)/2 = Angle$ . Be careful to identify which arc is "far" and which is "near" the vertex of the angle outside the circle.
- Fill in the Blanks Systematically:** Go through the diagram in a logical order. Solve for everything you can with the information you have. Each time you solve for a new value, it opens the door to solve for more. Keep a record of which angles you have solved and which are still missing.
- Check Your Work with the 360-Degree Rule:** Once you think you have solved for all the arcs, add them up. They must total 360 degrees. This is the ultimate check. If they do not, you have made an error in calculation or application of a theorem.
