CHOOSING YOUR LUNA PARK DESTINATION

Before diving into specific directions, it’s important to note that “Luna Park” refers to several amusement parks around the world. The most famous are in Sydney (at Milsons Point, just across the Harbour Bridge from the CBD) and Melbourne (at St Kilda, on the shores of Port Phillip Bay). There’s also a historic Luna Park in Coney Island, New York, though it operates under different management, and others in locations like Paris and Japan. For the purposes of this article, we will primarily focus on the two most visited Australian Luna Parks, as they are the ones travellers most frequently search for when asking “how to get to Luna Park.”

Always confirm which Luna Park you intend to visit. The directions will vary significantly depending on whether you are heading to Sydney’s harbour-side park or Melbourne’s beachside attraction. Throughout this guide, we will clearly label the relevant instructions for each location.

HOW TO GET TO LUNA PARK IN SYDNEY: MILSONS POINT

Luna Park Sydney sits at 1 Olympic Drive, Milsons Point, with spectacular views of the Sydney Harbour Bridge and Opera House. Its location is incredibly accessible by multiple modes of transport, making it one of the easiest attractions to reach.

By Train: The Fastest Option

The most direct way to get to Luna Park Sydney is by train. The nearest station is **Milsons Point Station**, which is on the T1 North Shore & Western Line. From Central Station, the journey takes approximately 10 minutes. Once you exit the station, take the pedestrian bridge over the Bradfield Highway and follow the signs down to the park. The walk is downhill and takes no more than five minutes. This option is fast, affordable, and avoids any traffic congestion around the harbour. Trains run frequently every few minutes during peak times.

By Ferry: The Scenic Route

If you want a memorable arrival, take a ferry. **Circular Quay** is the main hub for ferries in Sydney. Catch a ferry to **Milsons Point** – the trip takes about 10 minutes and offers postcard-perfect views of the bridge and opera house. The ferry wharf is directly adjacent to Luna Park. You can also catch a ferry from Darling Harbour or Barangaroo. This is arguably the most enjoyable way to arrive, and it’s a fantastic experience for first-time visitors. Ferries run regularly, and you can use an Opal card for payment.

By Bus: Convenient and Flexible

Several bus routes service the Milsons Point area. Routes 285 and 292 from the city and North Sydney stop on Alfred Street South, a short walk from the park. You can also catch the 230 bus from the city. Buses are a good option if you are coming from nearby suburbs and want to avoid train changes. Check the Transport NSW website for real-time schedules.

By Car: Driving and Parking

Driving to Luna Park Sydney is possible but can be challenging due to limited parking and high demand, especially on weekends. If you drive, the most convenient option is the **Luna Park Parking Station**, located directly underneath the park on 1 Olympic Drive. It is a secure, multi-level car park with spaces for cars and motorcycles. Expect to pay a flat rate for the day (prices vary by season). Be aware that the entry and exit are on a one-way street system. Alternatively, there is limited street parking in the surrounding residential areas of Kirribilli and McMahon’s Point, but you must read the signs carefully for resident permit zones and time limits. Using public transport is strongly recommended due to the popularity of the area.

By Taxi or Rideshare

Rideshare services like Uber and taxis are readily available from anywhere in Sydney. The drop-off point is at the main entrance on Olympic Drive. This is the easiest option for groups or those with heavy luggage, but expect surge pricing on busy days.

Walking from the Sydney Harbour Bridge

If you are already walking across the Sydney Harbour Bridge, you can actually descend into Luna Park via stairs or a lift near the Milsons Point side. The pedestrian walkway on the bridge gives you a fantastic view of the park below. From the city side, it’s about a 20-minute walk across the bridge. This route is free and provides unbeatable photo opportunities.

HOW TO GET TO LUNA PARK IN MELBOURNE: ST KILDA

Luna Park Melbourne is located in the seaside suburb of St Kilda, about 6 kilometres south of the city centre. It sits on the foreshore of Port Phillip Bay and is a beloved local institution. The journey is straightforward thanks to Melbourne’s excellent tram network.

By Tram: The Classic Melbourne Experience

The most iconic way to get to Luna Park Melbourne is by tram. Catch **Route 16** from the city (Swanston Street, near Flinders Street Station) or **Route 96** from Bourke Street. Both trams travel down Fitzroy Street in St Kilda. Get off at the stop near the corner of Fitzroy Street and Acland Street. From there, it is a short, pleasant walk along the foreshore to the park. The entire trip from Flinders Street Station takes about 25 minutes. You can use a Myki card for payment. Trams run frequently every 10-15 minutes during the day. This is the most popular and affordable method, and the tram ride itself offers a glimpse of Melbourne’s lively streets.

By Bus: Alternative Routes

Several bus routes also service St Kilda. The 623, 600, and 922 buses stop near the corner of Acland Street and the Esplanade. Buses can be slower than trams due to traffic, but they are a good backup option. The bus journey from the city takes around 30 minutes.

By Car: Driving and Parking in St Kilda

Driving to Luna Park Melbourne is manageable, but parking can be expensive and scarce on weekends and during summer. There is a large **car park** located under the park on the Esplanade, accessible from the corner of Esplanade and Cavell Street. Fees apply. Street parking is available on surrounding streets, including the Esplanade and Beaconsfield Parade, but pay attention to parking meters and time limits (usually 2-4 hours). On weekends, the area is extremely busy. Consider using a park-and-ride facility in the city or a nearby suburb and then hopping on a tram.

By Train and Tram Combination

While there is no train station directly at St Kilda, you can take a train to either South Yarra Station or Balaclava Station. From there, you can catch a tram or bus to the park. For instance, from Balaclava Station, catch the 16 tram towards St Kilda, or from South Yarra, catch the 8 tram. This can be a good option if you are coming from the outer suburbs.

By Bicycle or On Foot

St Kilda is well-connected by bike paths. You can ride along the beach from Port Melbourne or from the city via the Capital City Trail. There are bike racks near the park entrance. If you are staying in the St Kilda area, walking along the foreshore is a delightful way to approach Luna Park, with the iconic face and rollercoaster coming into view as you stroll.

By Rideshare or Taxi

As with any major attraction, Uber and taxis are widely available. A ride from Melbourne’s CBD to Luna Park St Kilda typically takes 15-20 minutes in normal traffic. Drop-off is right at the main entrance on the Esplanade.

GENERAL TIPS FOR ALL LUNA PARK LOCATIONS

Regardless of which Luna Park you are visiting, these universal tips will help you plan your trip more effectively.

Check Operating Hours Before You Go

Luna Park is not open every day. Hours vary by season, public holidays, and special events. Always check the official website for the specific Luna Park you plan to visit to avoid disappointment. Some parks open late or only on weekends during winter.

Consider Buying Tickets in Advance

To avoid queuing at the entrance, purchase your ride passes or unlimited access wristbands online. Many parks offer discounted online tickets. This is especially wise during school holidays or weekends when the park is busiest.

Plan for Crowds and Weather

Summer weekends are peak times at all Luna Parks. Arrive early (just after opening) to enjoy shorter lines. Check the weather forecast; many rides close during heavy rain or high winds. Also, sunscreen and hats are essential for sunny days, as both parks are exposed to the elements.

Accessibility Considerations

Both Sydney and Melbourne Luna Parks strive to be accessible. Most train stations and ferry wharves have step-free access. The parks themselves have wheelchair-friendly paths and accessible rides, but it is best to check the park’s accessibility guide on their website before your visit. Contact the park in advance if you require special assistance.

Public Transport Discounts and Passes

In Sydney, use an Opal card for the best fares; daily caps apply. In Melbourne, use a Myki card. Tourists can often purchase multi-day travel passes that include unlimited public transport, which can be cost-effective if you plan to visit other attractions.

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS ABOUT GETTING TO LUNA PARK

Is there a shuttle bus from the city to Luna Park?

No, there is no dedicated shuttle bus. However, the public transport options are so direct and frequent that a shuttle is unnecessary. In Sydney, the train and ferry are essentially shuttle services. In Melbourne, the tram works the same way.

How long does it take to get to Luna Park from the city centre?

In Sydney, from Central Station by train takes about 10 minutes. From Circular Quay by ferry takes 10 minutes. In Melbourne, from Flinders Street Station by tram takes roughly 25 minutes. Driving can take 15-30 minutes depending on traffic.

Can I walk to Luna Park from the Sydney Opera House?

Yes, but it’s a bit of a hike (about 40 minutes), including crossing the Sydney Harbour Bridge. A ferry from Circular Quay is much quicker and more fun.

Is parking free at Luna Park?

No. Both Sydney and Melbourne Luna Parks have paid parking. Street parking in the surrounding areas is metered or time-limited. Public transport is strongly recommended to save money and hassle.

What is the cheapest way to get to Luna Park?

The cheapest option is using public transport (train, tram, bus, or ferry) with a rechargeable transit card. In Sydney, the train from the city is very affordable. In Melbourne, the tram is the best value.
