Patterns and Sequences

2. **Shape Pattern:** A triangle has 3 sides. A square has 4. A pentagon has 5. How many sides does a decagon have? (*10 — but the teaser can be disguised: "If a triangle equals 3, a square equals 4, and a hexagon equals 6, what does a nonagon equal?" 9.*)

Word Problems with a Twist

1. **The Lunch Line:** In a line of 10 students, Alex is 3rd from the front. How many students are behind Alex? (*7 students behind — careful: it's a line of 10, so positions 4-10 are behind, that's 7.*)
2. **Strange Subtraction:** A man has 10 apples. He gives away all but 4. How many does he have left? (*4 — "all but 4" means he keeps 4.*)

TIPS FOR PARENTS AND TEACHERS: HOW TO USE MATH BRAIN TEASERS EFFECTIVELY
