- **Yolanda Denise King (1955-2007):** The eldest child, often called "Yoki," was an actress,

author, and motivational speaker. She showed early promise as a performer and used the arts to promote social change. Her memoir, *Open My Eyes, Open My Soul*, explored her journey of self-discovery as the daughter of a martyr. She served as the chair of the King Center for a time.

- **Martin Luther King III (1957-):** The first son and namesake, Martin III, has been a prominent civil rights activist in his own right. He has served as the president of the SCLC and, following in his mother's footsteps, as the president of the King Center. He has been a vocal advocate for voting rights, economic justice, and nonviolence, often speaking on the national and international stage.
- **Dexter Scott King (1961-2024):** Named after the Dexter Avenue Baptist Church in Montgomery where his father preached, Dexter was often seen as the son who most closely resembled his father in appearance. He served as the president of the King Center and was deeply involved in protecting the intellectual property of his father's legacy, including his famous speeches and image.
- **Bernice Albertine King (1963-):** The youngest child, Bernice, was only five years old when her father was assassinated. She experienced a profound calling to the ministry and is now a globally recognized Christian preacher and speaker. She is the founder and CEO of the Bernice A. King Center for Nonviolence Training. She often provides a spiritual and theological voice, keeping her father's message of love and reconciliation central to the movement's future.
