The Magician (I)

With one hand pointing to the sky and the other to the ground, the Magician embodies the principle “as above, so below.” On his table lie the four suits of the Minor Arcana—Wand, Cup, Sword, and Pentacle—signifying mastery and resourcefulness. The **Original Rider Waite Tarot Deck Meanings** for the Magician center on willpower, skill, and the ability to manifest desires.

The High Priestess (II)

Seated between the pillars of Jachin and Boaz, the High Priestess holds a scroll of hidden knowledge. She represents intuition, mystery, and the subconscious mind. When she appears, the message is often to pause, listen inward, and trust your inner voice rather than external logic.

Death (XIII)

One of the most misunderstood cards, Death in the Rider Waite deck does not predict physical death. Instead, it shows a skeletal figure on a white horse, carrying a black banner marked with a white rose. The imagery signifies transformation, release, and the inevitable end of one cycle so another can begin. It is a card of deep change.

The World (XXI)

The final Major Arcana card depicts a dancing figure within a wreath, flanked by the four living creatures of the zodiac. It stands for completion, fulfillment, and harmony. Achieving one’s goals or reaching a significant milestone is often indicated by The World.

THE MINOR ARCANA: FOUR SUITS, COUNTLESS STORIES

While the Major Arcana handles grand life arcs, the Minor Arcana provides the granular detail of daily experience. Each suit corresponds to an element and a realm of life.

Wands (Fire) – Creativity, Passion, Action

Wands cards often describe career, enterprise, and spiritual spark. For example, the Ace of Wands in the Original Rider Waite Tarot shows a hand holding a thriving wand, symbolizing inspiration and new ventures. The Seven of Wands depicts a man fighting from a higher position, indicating defense of one’s principles or standing one’s ground.

Cups (Water) – Emotions, Relationships, Intuition

The cups suit represents love, feelings, and emotional connections. The Three of Cups shows women celebrating with raised cups, a classic card for friendship, joy, and community. The iconic Ten of Cups illustrates a rainbow-hued family scene, meaning emotional fulfillment and domestic bliss.

Swords (Air) – Thoughts, Conflict, Intellect

Swords cards are associated with mental energy, communication, and sometimes strife. The Ace of Swords is a double-edged blade piercing a crown—clarity of mind and truth. The Eight of Swords shows a woman blindfolded and bound, representing feeling trapped by limiting beliefs.

Pentacles (Earth) – Material World, Work, Health

Pentacles deal with money, career, physical health, and practical stability. The Ace of Pentacles is a golden coin offered from a heavenly hand, marking financial opportunity or a new job. The Ten of Pentacles shows a prosperous family scene, indicating wealth, legacy, and security.

THE COURT CARDS: PERSONALITY TYPES OR INNER ENERGIES

Each suit contains four court cards: Page, Knight, Queen, and King. In the **Original Rider Waite Tarot Deck Meanings**, these can represent actual people in a querent’s life or aspects of their own personality.

- **Page:** A youthful, curious energy. The Page of Wands is an explorer; Page of Cups, a dreamer; Page of Swords, a communicator; Page of Pentacles, a student.
- **Knight:** Active, focused pursuit. Knight of Wands is bold; Knight of Cups, romantic; Knight of Swords, aggressive; Knight of Pentacles, diligent.
- **Queen:** Mature, nurturing internal energy. Queen of Wands is charismatic; Queen of Cups, empathetic; Queen of Swords, clear-headed; Queen of Pentacles, earthy and generous.
- **King:** Authoritative mastery. King of Wands is visionary; King of Cups, wise; King of Swords, intellectual; King of Pentacles, prosperous.
