How the Curriculum Is Structured

Before Five in a Row comes as a large, spiral-bound manual that contains lesson plans for 24 classic picture books (the “Five in a Row” titles) plus additional “Before Five in a Row” suggestions for very young toddlers. Each book chapter includes a synopsis, a brief social or emotional theme, and then a collection of activity

1. **Day 1:** Read the book aloud for enjoyment. Introduce the title, author, and illustrator. Let your child hold the book and explore the illustrations.
2. **Day 2:** Reread the book, then focus on a social/emotional or language activity: talk about characters’ feelings, practice retelling, or act out a scene.
3. **Day 3:** Reread and introduce a simple math or science concept connected to the story (e.g., counting blueberries in

Blueberries for Sal).

4. **Day 4:** Reread and do an art, music, or motor skills activity (e.g., painting a picture from the story, singing a related song, or a game using the book's themes).
5. **Day 5:** Reread again and then do a "go-along" experience—a visit to a park, a cooking project, or a field trip that extends the learning.

This gentle repetition solidifies language patterns and story structure while the activities keep the experience fresh. Importantly, you can adapt the schedule to your child's mood and attention. Some days you might do two

activities; other days just reading is enough. The **flexibility** of Before Five in a Row is one of its greatest strengths.

Key Skills Addressed in Before Five in a Row

experiments.

- **Social-Emotional Growth:** Discussing feelings, conflict resolution, empathy, and kindness as modeled by characters.
- **Creative Expression:** Art projects, music and movement, dramatic play, and storytelling.

The beauty of the program is that skills are not isolated. A single book like *The Carrot Seed* can yield a gardening project (science), counting seeds (math), and a conversation about patience (social-emotional).

Before Five in a Row vs. Five in a Row: What's the Difference?

Understanding the distinction between these two levels helps parents choose the right starting point.

Before Five in a Row is intended for children ages 2-4 and focuses on a very gentle, play-based, and connection-

rich introduction to learning through books. The suggested activities are short (5-15 minutes) and require minimal preparation. The manual also includes a special section for babies and toddlers with ideas for sensory play, nursery rhymes, and bonding activities.

Five in a Row (for ages 5-8) uses more complex chapter books or picture books with deeper themes. Children are expected to sit for longer periods and participate in more structured lessons. **Before Five in a Row** is the ideal warm-up for what comes later, ensuring that a child

associates learning with warmth and wonder before formal demands are placed on them.

Practical Tips for Getting Started with Before Five in a Row

1. **Gather the books first.** You will need the 24

7. **Keep a journal or scrapbook.** Document your child's favorite activities, art projects, or dictations about the story. This becomes a treasured memory and also shows progress.
8. **Connect with other BFIAR users.** Many online communities share activity ideas and support, helping you stay inspired.

Sample Week with "Blueberries for Sal" by Robert McCloskey

To illustrate how the curriculum unfolds, here is a sample week using one of the most beloved BFIAR books:

- **Day 1 - Read for pure enjoyment.**

Snuggle up and read the story.

Talk about the illustrations—the blueberry bushes, the mother bear and cub. Ask: “What do you think will happen?”

- **Day 2 - Social/Emotional and Language.**

Reread. Discuss how Sal and the bear cub both get separated from their mothers. How did they feel? Scared? Brave? Act out the story together using stuffed animals.

- **Day 3 - Math and Science.**

Reread. Count blueberries: give your child a handful of fresh or frozen blueberries to count (and eat a

few!). Compare sizes: big blueberry, small blueberry. Talk about how blueberries grow on bushes.

- **Day 4 - Art and Motor Skills.**

Reread. Do a blueberry print painting: dip a halved lemon or a pom-pom in blue paint and make prints on paper. Or practice fine motor by having your child thread a piece of yarn through blueberries (dried or large beads) to make a necklace.

- **Day 5 - Go-Along Experience.**

Visit a farmer’s market or grocery store to

buy blueberries. Make a simple blueberry muffin or jam. Talk about where food comes from. You might also draw a picture of the bear and Sal.

or a core program for gentle, literature-based learning. Many families combine it with free play, nature time, and basic letter/sound exposure as they see fit.

Can I use it if I do not homeschool?

Absolutely. Many parents use BFIAR as a guide to enhance storytime at home, even if their child attends a daycare or preschool. The activities are simple enough to do after work or on weekends.
