Urban vs. Rural Regionalism

More realistic than state-level secession is the fragmentation of states themselves. California, Oregon, and New York are deeply divided between liberal urban centers and conservative rural areas. Some **Second American Civil War scenarios** hypothesize that states could internally fracture.
