- **Communications (06xx):**

Communications Marines install, operate, and maintain the networks that allow the Corps to share information. This includes radio operators, network administrators, and satellite communications specialists.

- **Administration and Personnel**

(01xx): These Marines handle personnel records, pay, and administrative support for units. They ensure that Marines are paid correctly and that records are maintained.

- **Medical and Legal (60xx and 44xx):** Medical MOSs include corpsmen and medical technicians, while legal MOSs include paralegals and legal clerks.
- **Engineer and Construction (13xx):** Engineer Marines build and maintain infrastructure, clear obstacles, and provide combat

engineering support. This includes combat engineers, electricians, and plumbing specialists.

A Detailed Look at the List of Marine Corps MOS by Category

To fully appreciate the diversity of the **List Of Marine Corps Mos**, it is helpful to examine some of the specific

INFANTRY AND COMBAT ARMS (03xx)

Infantry MOSs are demanding both physically and mentally. Marines in this field are expected to be proficient in small arms, tactics, and physical fitness. They are the tip of the spear in any conflict.

LOGISTICS AND SUPPLY (04xx)

Logistics is the backbone of any military operation. Without effective logistics, frontline units cannot fight. Key MOSs in this field include:

- **0411 Maintenance Management Specialist:** Coordinates the repair and maintenance of equipment.
- **0431 Logistics/Embarkation Specialist:** Plans and executes the movement of personnel and equipment.
- **0451 Airborne/Parachute Rigger:** Packs parachutes and prepares equipment for

airdrop.

- **0471 Landing Support Specialist:** Manages the loading and unloading of ships and aircraft.
- **0481 Landing Support Specialist:** Assists with beach and port operations.

Logistics Marines often work behind the lines, but their work is essential to the success of every mission. They ensure that Marines have ammunition, food, fuel, and spare parts.

AVIATION (60xx-75xx)

Marine Corps aviation covers a wide range of aircraft and support roles. This field

includes both aircrew and ground support personnel. Key MOSs include:

- **6002 Aircraft Maintenance Officer:**

Leads maintenance units that keep aircraft flying.

- **6111 CH-53**

Helicopter

Crew Chief:

Responsible for the safety and operation of heavy-lift helicopters.

- **6211 F/A-18**

Hornet

Mechanic:

Performs maintenance on fighter jets.

- **6311 AV-8B**

Harrier

Mechanic:

Maintains vertical/short takeoff and landing aircraft.

- **6411 MV-22**

Osprey

Mechanic:

Maintains tiltrotor aircraft.

- **6511**

Unmanned

Aerial Vehicle

Operator:

Operates drones for reconnaissance and surveillance.

- **6611 Air Traffic**

Controller:

Controls aircraft movements on the ground and in the air.

- **6811 Aviation**

Ordinance

Technician:

Handles and loads aircraft weapons and munitions.

Aviation MOSs require significant technical training. Many of these roles involve advanced electromechanical systems and rigorous safety protocols.

INTELLIGENCE AND COMMUNICATIONS (02XX AND 06XX)

Intelligence and communications are critical to modern warfare. These fields ensure that commanders have the information they need and the ability to disseminate orders. Key MOSs include:

- **0211 Counterintelligence/Human Intelligence Specialist:**
Gathers intelligence through human sources and conducts counterintelligence operations.
- **0231 Intelligence Specialist:**
Analyzes and produces intelligence reports.
- **0241 Imagery Analyst:**
Interprets aerial and satellite imagery.
- **0261 Geospatial Intelligence Specialist:**
Creates maps and terrain analysis products.
- **0612 Wireman:**
Installs and maintains telephone and data networks.
- **0621 Field Radio Operator:**
Operates tactical radio communications.
- **0631 Network Administrator:**
Manages computer networks and servers.

- **0651 Cyber Network Operator:**

Protects Marine Corps networks from cyber threats.

These fields often require a security clearance and a high level of technical aptitude. Marines in intelligence and communications are integral to the decision-making process at all levels.

ADMINISTRATION AND PERSONNEL (01xx)

The administrative field keeps the Marine Corps running smoothly. These Marines handle the paperwork and personnel management that keeps units organized. Key MOSs include:

- **0111 Administrative Specialist:**

Manages correspondence, records, and reports.

- **0121 Personnel Clerk:** Processes personnel actions and maintains service records.

- **0151 Postal Clerk:** Manages mail operations for units.

- **0161 Postal Officer:** Oversees postal operations in a unit.

Administrative Marines are found in every unit, from infantry battalions to headquarters companies. They ensure that the Marine Corps functions as a professional organization.

MEDICAL AND LEGAL (60XX AND 44XX)

Medical and legal MOSs provide essential services to Marines. While doctors and lawyers are officers, enlisted Marines serve as technicians in these fields. Key MOSs include:

- **4001 Legal Services Officer:** Provides legal advice to commanders.
- **4421 Legal Clerk:** Assists with legal documents and court proceedings.
- **6021 Surgical Technician:** Assists in surgeries and medical procedures.
- **6031**

Independent Duty

Corpsman:

Provides medical care in remote locations.

- **6044 Dental Assistant:**

Assists dentists with patient care.

These MOSs are critical to maintaining the health and readiness of the force. Medical personnel are often embedded with combat units, providing care in austere environments.

How to Choose an MOS from the

List of Marine Corps MOS
