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## WHAT IS SIC ET NON? THE STRUCTURE OF A REVOLUTIONARY TEXT

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**Sic et Non** (Yes and No) is a compilation of 158 theological questions, each presented with seemingly contradictory quotations from the Bible, Church Fathers, and other authoritative sources. Abelard did not provide answers. Instead, he arranged the material so that the reader would be forced to confront the contradictions, analyze the context, and use reason to resolve the apparent conflicts.

The work opens with a famous prologue in which Abelard outlines his method. He writes, "By doubting we come to inquiry,

and by inquiry we perceive the truth." This simple statement encapsulates the purpose of the entire project. For Abelard, doubt was not the enemy of faith; it was the engine of understanding.

Each question in **Sic et Non** follows a consistent pattern. First, Abelard presents the arguments in favor of a proposition (the "Sic" or Yes side). Then, he presents the arguments against (the "Non" or No side). The reader is left to weigh the evidence, consider the authority of each source, and arrive at a reasoned conclusion. This dialectical structure became the foundation of the scholastic method used in medieval universities.

# Examples of Questions in Sic et Non

- That faith should be based on reason, and that it should not.

These were not trivial puzzles. They were central to theological and philosophical debates of the 12th century. By presenting both sides, Abelard was implicitly arguing that truth emerges from conflict, not from passive acceptance.

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## THE DIALECTICAL METHOD: DOUBT AS A PATH TO TRUTH

These guidelines show that Abelard was not merely a provocateur. He was a careful scholar who understood the complexity of interpreting ancient texts. His approach anticipated many of the principles of modern textual criticism and hermeneutics.

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### **CONTROVERSY AND CONDEMNATION: WHY SIC ET NON WAS DANGEROUS**

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Not everyone appreciated Abelard's approach. His critics, most notably Bernard of Clairvaux, accused him of

undermining faith and promoting skepticism. They argued that by highlighting contradictions in authoritative sources, Abelard was encouraging doubt and weakening the foundations of Christian doctrine.

In 1140, at the Council of Sens, Bernard successfully had Abelard condemned. Some of his works, including parts of **Sic et Non**, were ordered to be burned. Abelard was forced into silence and spent his final years under the protection of Peter the Venerable at Cluny Abbey. He died in 1142.

The irony is that Abelard was not an unbeliever. He was a deeply religious man who believed that reason could strengthen faith. He saw no conflict between logic and revelation. But in an age when authority was often

considered absolute, his willingness to question even the greatest figures was seen as a threat.

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### THE LEGACY OF SIC ET NON: BUILDING THE FOUNDATIONS OF SCHOLASTICISM

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Despite the condemnation, the influence of **Peter Abelard Sic Et Non** cannot be overstated. The text became a model for later scholastic thinkers, most notably **Thomas Aquinas**.
