6. **Serve immediately:** Transfer the sole to a warm plate. Spoon the buttery caper and lemon pan sauce over the top. Finish with a grating of lemon zest, the remaining fresh parsley, and a final pinch of sea salt flakes.

Key Tips for Perfect Results

- **Do not overcrowd the pan:** Cook one or two fish at a time.

Overcrowding lowers the pan temperature, leading to steaming instead of browning.
