They were victims who were forced to become oppressors. Levi shows that it is too simple to call them traitors or monsters; their situation was a deliberate creation of the SS, designed to break the last vestiges of solidarity among prisoners. The Grey Zone is a concept that has since been applied to many other historical and political contexts, but Levi's original exploration of it in **If This Is A Man** remains the definitive treatment.

Shame and the Witness

Another persistent theme is the feeling of shame that survivors often experience. Levi writes of the shame of being alive when others have died, the shame of having begged, the shame of having been stripped of one's dignity.
