- **Market Structures:** Perfect competition, monopoly, oligopoly (game theory), and monopolistic competition. Know how to graph each structure and identify profit, loss, and shut-down conditions.
- **Factor Markets:** Derived demand, marginal revenue product, hiring decisions, wage determination in competitive and monopsony labor markets.
- **Market Failure and Government Intervention:** Externalities, public goods, and the role of government (taxes, subsidies, regulation).

## Break Down Macroeconomics

For AP Macroeconomics, the key topics include:

- **Basic Concepts and Measurement:** Circular flow, GDP (expenditure and income

approaches), inflation (CPI and GDP deflator), unemployment (types and natural rate).

- **National Income and Price Determination:** Aggregate demand, aggregate supply (short-run and long-run), equilibrium, and the multiplier effect.
- **Fiscal Policy:** Government spending and taxes, expansionary and contractionary policy, crowding out, and the loanable funds market.
- **Monetary Policy:** Functions of money, the Federal Reserve, money creation, tools of monetary policy, and the money market. Understand the relationship between interest rates, investment, and output.
- **Inflation and Unemployment:** The Phillips curve (short-run and long-run), the trade-off in the short run, and expectations.
- **International Trade and Finance:** Comparative advantage, tariffs, balance of payments, exchange rates (floating and fixed), and the foreign exchange market.

## Use Active Recall and Practice

As you review each topic, do not just read passively. Take notes in your own words, create flashcards for key definitions and formulas (e.g.,  $MPC = \text{change in consumption} / \text{change in income}$ ), and draw each graph from memory. After studying a section, immediately test yourself with a set of 10–15 multiple-choice questions.
