- 5. **Neglecting the Review Phase:** After completing the initial study of all domains, allocate sufficient time for comprehensive review. This is where you connect concepts across domains and strengthen your overall understanding.

FINAL STEPS BEFORE EXAM DAY

As your exam date approaches, shift your focus from learning new material to reinforcing what you already know. Your **CTS exam preparation** should enter a consolidation phase. Here is a checklist for the final week:
