- **Fluency Goal:** 30-40 WPM with appropriate expression.
- **Vocabulary:** Practicing synonyms and antonyms. Learning to use context clues to understand word meanings.

Quarter 3: Deepening Understanding (February - March)

- **Focus:** Multisyllabic words and complex sentences.
- **Phonics:** Decoding two-syllable words (e.g., napkin, rabbit), inflectional endings (-s, -ed, -ing), and compound words.
- **Comprehension:** Comparing and contrasting characters or two texts on the same topic. Explaining how illustrations support the text. Identifying the main purpose of a text (e.g., to explain, to entertain).
- **Fluency Goal:** 40-60 WPM with increased accuracy and self-correction.
- **Vocabulary:** Understanding categories of words (e.g., sorting animals by where they live). Using words and phrases acquired through conversations and read-alouds.

Quarter 4: Refining and Culminating (April - June)

- **Focus:** Independence and stamina.
- **Phonics:** Review of all patterns, focusing on spelling and writing connections. Introduction of less common vowel teams (e.g., oi, oy, au, aw).
- **Comprehension:** Integrating knowledge from two texts on the same topic. Reading with purpose and understanding. Distinguishing between information provided by pictures and information provided by words.
- **Fluency Goal:** 60-80 WPM with smooth, expressive reading.
- **Vocabulary:** Understanding figurative language (similes, idioms) at an introductory level. Using final assessments to reinforce all year-long vocabulary.
