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Few songs in the modern rock canon command as much immediate recognition as Muse's "Supermassive Black Hole." Released in 2006 on the album *Black Holes and Revelations*, the track marked a bold departure for the band, blending funk, glam

rock, and electronic influences into a sleek, danceable juggernaut. At its heart, driving the entire sonic architecture, is a bass line that is deceptively simple yet endlessly rewarding to play. For bassists, finding an accurate and well-annotated

**Supermassive Black Hole bass tab** is the first step toward mastering one of the most iconic riffs of the 21st century. This guide will take you deep into the song's structure, the nuances of the tablature, and the techniques required to replicate

Chris Wolstenholme's signature sound.

## THE PHENOMENON BEHIND THE BASS LINE

Before diving into the mechanics of the tab, it is worth appreciating why this particular bass part has become a rite of passage for players worldwide. Chris Wolstenholme, Muse's bassist, is renowned for his aggressive, effects-driven style. In "Supermassive Black Hole," he abandons the traditional rock bass role of root-note support. Instead, he locks into a syncopated, almost percussive groove that functions as the song's primary rhythmic anchor. The **Supermassive Black Hole bass tab** is not merely a transcription

of notes; it is a blueprint for a specific feel. The line is built around a repeating four-bar pattern that relies heavily on octaves and chromatic passing tones. This creates a sense of forward motion that perfectly contrasts the song's dark, swaggering verses and explosive chorus. The popularity of the bass tab reflects the song's enduring appeal—it is challenging enough for intermediate players to sink their teeth into, yet accessible enough for motivated beginners.

## Understa nding the

# Tablature Format

Standard bass tablature uses four lines, each representing a string (E, A, D, G from bottom to top). Numbers on these lines indicate which fret to press. A typical **Supermassive Black Hole bass tab** will show the main riff in standard tuning (E-A-D-G). However, many transcriptions include notations for slides, hammer-ons, and palm muting. One common point of confusion for new players is the song's time signature. The verse riff is played in a tight 4/4 time, but the syncopation can make it feel like it is pulling against the beat. An accurate tab will clearly mark the

rhythmic placement of each note, often using dashes or standard music note stems. When searching for a tab, look for versions that include both the fret numbers and rhythmic indicators. The most reliable tabs also specify the recommended fingerings, particularly for the rapid octave jumps that define the song's character.

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## DECONSTRUCTING THE MAIN RIFF

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The song's verse riff is where the magic happens. It revolves around a simple E minor tonality but is elevated by Wolstenholme's rhythmic ingenuity. A standard **Supermassive Black Hole bass tab** will show the riff starting on the open E string,

moving to the 5th fret of the A string, and then leaping to the 7th fret of the D string. This octave pattern is the backbone. Here is a breakdown of the key components you will see in any quality tab:

- **The Octave**

**Jump:** The riff frequently jumps between a low root note (E) and its octave (E two strings up). This creates a wide, spacious sound. The tab will show this as a 0 on the E string followed by a 7 on the D string.

- **The Chromatic**

**Walk:** Between the main motifs, there is a descending chromatic line. A precise tab will indicate notes like 5-4-3 on the

A string, leading smoothly into the next repetition. This is the “secret sauce” that gives the line its bluesy, funky edge.

- **Ghost Notes and Muting:**

While not always explicitly written, advanced tabs use an 'x' to denote percussive ghost notes. These are essential for replicating the live sound. The right hand should remain relaxed, brushing the strings to create a short, choked sound between the main notes.

# Tone and Effects: What the Tab Cannot Tell You

A **Supermassive Black Hole bass tab** provides the fretboard map, but the destination is defined by your tone. Wolstenholme's sound on this track is heavily processed. He uses a blend of distortion, chorus, and a touch of compression to achieve that gritty, synth-like attack. To get close to the recorded sound, consider the following signal chain:

1. **Bass:** A passive bass with split-coil pickups (like a Fender Jazz Bass) works well. Play with a pick for a sharper attack.
2. **Compression:** A moderate amount of compression will even out the dynamic range, ensuring the pulled notes are as loud as the fretted ones.
3. **Distortion/Overdrive:** A light overdrive pedal set just at the edge of breakup. You want the notes to growl, not turn into static.
4. **Chorus or Flanger:** A subtle modulation effect adds the

shimmer that makes the line cut through the mix.

Experiment with your pickup balance. For this song, many players find that soloing the bridge pickup (closer to the neck) or using both in parallel yields the most authentic tone.

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## TECHNIQUES TO MASTER FOR AN AUTHENTIC PERFORMANCE

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Merely reading the **Supermassive Black Hole bass tab** and playing the correct notes is only half the

battle. To truly capture the groove, you must internalize several specific techniques:

## Syncopated Timing

The song's groove lives in the space between the beats. The bass line often plays on the "and" of beats 1, 2, 3, and 4. Practice with a metronome set to a slow tempo (60 BPM) and focus on locking in to the off-beats. The tab is a guide, but your ear must feel the push and pull

against the kick drum. Listen to the original track repeatedly; the bass is slightly ahead of the beat in some sections, creating a tense, urgent feel.

## Right- Hand Pick Control

Wolstenholme uses a pick on this track, and the attack is crucial. Hold the pick with a firm but not rigid grip. When playing the octave jumps, use a downstroke for the low E and an upstroke for

the higher octave. This creates a natural accent pattern that the tab will not explicitly show. For the ghost notes, lightly rest the edge of your palm on the strings near the bridge to mute them, then dig in for the accented notes.

## String Skippin g

The octave jumps require accurate string skipping. Your right hand must be able to jump from the thickest string to a

**VERIFYING** the E string without hitting the middle strings. Practice the motion slowly: start on the E string, then skip the A string entirely to land on the D string. Your left hand will also need to travel physically down the neck, which can be disorienting at first. A good **Supermassive Black Hole bass tab** will often include fingering suggestions (e.g., 1st finger for the 5th fret, 3rd or 4th finger for the 7th fret) to minimize hand fatigue.

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## FINDING AND

## ACCURATE BASS TABS

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The internet is awash with user-submitted tabs, and quality varies wildly. For a song as rhythmically complex as this, a poorly transcribed **Supermassive Black Hole bass tab** can lead to bad habits. Here are the best resources for finding reliable transcriptions:

- **Ultimate Guitar (UG):** The most popular repository. Look for tabs with high user



ratings and official artist verification if available. The “Bass Tab” section often has multiple versions; compare the top three to find a consensus on the main riff.

- **Songsterr**: Offers interactive, play-along tabs with real-time scrolling. The audio playback is invaluable for understanding rhythm. The

notation is usually more accurate than static text tabs.

- **YouTube Tutorials with On-Screen Tabs:**

Many bass educators provide video breakdowns with the tab displayed on screen. This is often the best way to learn, as you can see the fingerings and hear the rhythm simultaneously.

- **Official**

## Songbooks:

The most accurate source is the official Muse bass tab book for *Black Holes and Revelations*. These are professionally transcribed and include all the nuanced markings that free tabs omit.

When evaluating a **Supermassive Black Hole bass tab**, check the comments section. If multiple users point out errors in the bridge section or

chorus, proceed with caution. Also, be wary of tabs that simplify the rhythm too much. The real feel of the song comes from its subtle syncopation, which a lazy transcription might ignore.

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## COMMON MISTAKES AND HOW TO AVOID THEM

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Even with a perfect **Supermassive Black Hole bass tab**, players often fall into predictable traps. Awareness is the first step to correction.

- **Rushing the Tempo:**

The song's energy tempts players to speed up. The verse riff should feel locked and steady. Use a drum track or the original song as a backing track. Focus on playing slightly behind the beat for a heavier feel.

- **Neglecting the Ghost**

**Notes:**

Many beginner tabs omit the percussive

pops between the melodic notes. Without these, the line sounds thin. Lightly brush the strings with your fretting hand at the indicated moments (often on the "e" of each beat).

- **Overplaying the Chorus:**

The chorus bass line is simpler and more sustained. Resist the urge to add extra fills. The power

# Buildin g a Practic e Routin e

To truly own this  
song, dedicate  
10-15 minutes  
per day to  
structured  
practice. Start by  
isolating the  
verse riff. Play it  
20 times  
perfectly at 70%  
speed. Then,  
move to the  
chorus transition.  
The tab will often

show a clean shift from the verse pattern to a sustained G and D power chord shape. Practice this switch until it is silent and fluid. Finally, play through the entire song structure (verse, chorus, bridge, solo) without stopping, even if you make mistakes. This builds the muscle memory needed for a live performance.

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### EXPLORING THE SONG'S STRUCTURE THROUGH THE TAB

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A comprehensive **Supermassive Black Hole** bass tab will

cover the entire song, not just the famous verse riff. Understanding the full structure is key to a complete performance. The song opens with the bass alone, setting the stage. The verse riff repeats four times before the chorus hits. In the chorus, the bass plays a more melodic, sustained line that mirrors the vocal melody. The bridge section introduces a new, higher-register pattern that requires shifting to the 7th and 9th positions on the neck. The tab will indicate these

position shifts with numbers in parentheses or arrows. Pay special attention to the dynamics: the verse should be played with a biting, aggressive tone, while the chorus allows for a

slightly rounder, more open sound. The bass solo section (often a simplified version of the verse riff with added fills) is a chance to show off your control
