- "it teaches you" uses the second-person "you," which is often considered too informal. A revision might say "it teaches readers about bravery."
- "its a classic" should be "it's a classic" (with an apostrophe to indicate the contraction of "it is").

Practice passages like these, with explicit explanations for each correction, build the analytical skills students need on test day.

How Parents and Teachers Can Support Revising and Editing Practice
