- Multiply fractions by whole numbers (fifth grade).

Geometry standards in these grades include understanding area and perimeter, classifying shapes by properties, and graphing points on a coordinate plane.

GRADES 6 THROUGH 8: RATIOS, EXPRESSIONS, AND ALGEBRAIC THINKING

Middle school mathematics under the Illinois Math Common Core Standards marks a transition from arithmetic to algebra. Key domains include:

- **Ratios and Proportional Relationships:** Understanding unit rates, percentages, and scale drawings.
- **The Number System:** Extending to rational numbers, including negatives, and working with integers.
- **Expressions and Equations:** Writing and solving one-variable equations, using properties of operations, and graphing linear relationships.

For several years, Illinois used the Partnership for Assessment of Readiness for College and Careers (PARCC) exam to measure student progress against the Illinois Math Common Core Standards. In 2020, Illinois transitioned to the Illinois Assessment of Readiness (IAR), which still aligns closely with the Common Core. The IAR is administered to students in grades 3 through 8, covering both mathematics and English language arts.

High school students typically take the SAT, which the state adopted as its accountability assessment. The SAT is also aligned with the Common Core, so students following the Illinois Math Common Core Standards are well-prepared for the math sections.

Assessments emphasize problem-solving and reasoning over rote computation. Open-response items require students to explain their thinking, justify answers, and show multiple methods.
