
How To Care For Axolotls As Pets

- **Adults (over 6 inches):** Feed every 2 to 3 days. A single large earthworm or 2-3 pellets is usually sufficient.

Watch your axolotl's body condition. A healthy axolotl has a body width roughly the same size as its head. Overfeeding can lead to obesity, while underfeeding will cause a visible loss of mass. This balance is a critical part of mastering **how to care for axolotls as pets**.
