The ritual often includes a series of questions and answers that explore the candidate's understanding of duty and loyalty.
- **The Degree of Lady Knight or Dame of the Temple:** This is the final and highest degree conferring full knighthood. The ritual is elaborate and deeply moving. The candidate is presented with a sword, which remains sheathed to symbolize that the Lady Knight fights spiritual battles, not physical ones. She receives a crown, representing the crown of eternal life promised to the faithful. A solemn vow is taken, and the candidate is formally dubbed a Lady Knight Templar with a light touch of the sword on each shoulder. This ceremony is the heart of the Lady Knights Templar ritual.

In addition to initiatic degrees, the Lady Knights Templar ritual includes ceremonies for installation of officers, dedications of regalia, and memorial services for deceased members. Each of these uses specific prayers, hymns, and symbolic actions.

MODERN PRACTICE AND VARIATIONS OF THE LADY

- **The Jewel:** Members wear a jewel or medal of the order, usually a cross and crown suspended from a ribbon, indicating their rank and affiliation.

The Chapter Room and
Altar

The Lady Knights Templar ritual is conducted in a chapter room, which is set up to resemble a medieval Templar chapel or castle hall. At the center is an altar draped in white or red, upon which rest the Bible, the cross, the sword, and the crown. Candles are arranged to represent the three principal virtues: faith (a white candle), hope (a blue or green candle), and charity (a red candle). The room is often decorated with banners bearing Templar crosses and mottoes.

The arrangement of the room and the placement of officers around the altar create a sacred space that facilitates the ritual’s spiritual impact. The use of light and shadow, the ringing of bells, and the recitation of ancient prayers all contribute to an atmosphere of reverence and mystery.

Branches

There are two principal streams of the Lady Knights Templar ritual today. The first is the Masonic stream, where the Ladies serve as an auxiliary to male Templar bodies. In this context, the ritual is supervised by a Grand Commandery of Knights Templar (male) and follows a standard ritual book. The second is the independent or non-Masonic stream, where women organize and practice the ritual autonomously, sometimes with their own governing bodies.
