

# How To Cook Raw Prawns

## To Peel or Not to Peel

Cooking with the shell on yields more flavor, as the shell protects the delicate flesh and adds a subtle depth to the final dish. It also helps prevent overcooking. However, peeled prawns are more convenient to eat and allow seasonings to penetrate directly. For most pan-frying and sautéing applications, peeled prawns work beautifully. For grilling and boiling, leaving the shell on is often preferred. You can also leave the tail segment attached for a classic presentation, which provides a handy natural handle for dipping.

## Deveining Raw Prawns

The dark vein that runs along the back of a raw prawn is the digestive tract. While it is not harmful to eat, it can be gritty and unappealing. Deveining is simple. Using a sharp paring knife, make a shallow incision along the back of the prawn, from the head end to the tail. Use the tip of the knife or your fingers to lift out the vein and discard it. Rinse the prawn briefly under cold water. This step is particularly important if you are serving the prawns with the shell off, as the vein is more visible. For shell-on cooking, you can still devein without fully peeling by cutting through the shell along the back and removing the vein in the same way.

## ESSENTIAL TECHNIQUES FOR COOKING RAW PRAWNS

Now we arrive at the core of the matter. There are several excellent ways to cook raw prawns, each producing a slightly different result. The golden rule that applies across all methods is this: prawns cook very quickly, and they are best the moment they turn opaque and pink. Overcooking by even thirty seconds can turn them rubbery and tough.

## How to Boil Raw Prawns

Boiling is one of the simplest and most traditional methods for cooking raw prawns, especially when you plan to chill them for salads or serve them cold with cocktail sauce. The key is to boil them in well-salted water, which seasons the flesh from the outside in. Some cooks also add bay leaves, peppercorns, lemon halves, or a splash of white wine to the boiling liquid for extra flavor.

To boil raw prawns, bring a large pot of water to a rolling boil. Add a generous amount of salt—about one tablespoon per quart of water. Drop the prawns into the water and stir gently. Watch carefully. As soon as the prawns turn pink and opaque and begin to float, they are done. This usually takes between two and four minutes, depending on the size of the prawns. Have a bowl of ice water ready next to the stove. Using a slotted spoon, transfer the cooked prawns directly into the ice water to stop the cooking process immediately. This shock also makes the shells easier to peel later. Drain well and pat dry. If serving warm, skip the ice bath and simply drain, but serve immediately as they will continue to cook from residual heat.

## How to Pan-Fry or Sauté Raw Prawns

Pan-frying is arguably the fastest and most common way to cook raw prawns at home, and it delivers beautifully caramelized results. Start by patting your peeled prawns dry with paper towels. Moisture is the enemy of browning, so removing excess water is essential. Season the prawns simply with salt and pepper, or with your preferred spice blend.

Heat a heavy skillet over medium-high heat and add a good glug of oil with a high smoke point, such as avocado or grapeseed oil. You want the pan hot enough that the prawns sizzle the moment they hit the surface. Add the prawns in a single layer without crowding the pan. If you add too many at once, they will steam rather than sear. Cook for about two minutes on the first side, until the bottom

is golden and the sides are turning pink. Flip each prawn and cook for another one to two minutes on the second side. The prawns are done when they are completely pink, firm to the touch, and just cooked through. Remove them from the hot pan immediately to prevent carryover cooking. A squeeze of lemon juice or a pat of butter swirled in at the end adds a beautiful finish.

## How to Grill Raw Prawns

Grilling imparts a wonderful smoky char that pairs beautifully with the natural sweetness of prawns. You can grill prawns either on skewers (which makes flipping easier and prevents them from falling through the grates) or directly on the grill if you are using shell-on prawns. For skewers, thread the prawns onto metal or soaked wooden skewers, leaving a small gap between each one to allow heat to circulate.

Preheat your grill to medium-high heat. Brush the prawns lightly with oil and season. Place the skewers on the grill and cook for about two to three minutes per side. You are looking for bright pink shells and lightly charred edges. The flesh should be opaque throughout. Grilled prawns are excellent served with a chimichurri, garlic butter, or a simple squeeze of lime.

## How to Bake or Roast Raw Prawns

Baking is a hands-off method that works beautifully, especially when cooking a large batch. It is also ideal for sheet pan meals where prawns are paired with vegetables. Preheat your oven to 400°F (200°C). Toss your raw prawns with oil and seasonings, then spread them in a single layer on a baking sheet lined with parchment paper or lightly greased. Roast for six to ten minutes, depending on size, until the prawns are pink and firm. There is no need to flip them halfway through, though you can if you want more even browning. The high heat cooks them quickly without drying them out.

## How to Steam Raw Prawns

Steaming is a gentle cooking method that preserves the delicate texture of prawns beautifully. It is especially popular in Asian cuisines, where prawns are often steamed with ginger, scallions, and a splash of soy sauce or rice wine. To steam, bring about an inch of water to a boil in a pot fitted with a steamer basket. Arrange the prawns in a single layer in the basket, cover, and steam for three to five minutes, depending on size. The prawns are ready when they are bright pink and just firm. Steamed prawns have a clean, pure flavor and are excellent with a light dipping sauce.

## COMMON MISTAKES TO AVOID WHEN COOKING RAW PRAWNS

Even experienced cooks can make errors with prawns because the window between perfectly cooked and overcooked is so narrow. Here are the most common pitfalls and how to avoid them.

- **Overcooking:** This is the number one mistake. Prawns cook in minutes, and they continue to cook from residual heat after being removed from the heat source. Err on the side of under-doneness and remove them just as they turn pink. When in doubt, cut into the thickest part of one prawn to check.
- **Not drying the prawns:** For pan-frying and grilling, excess moisture prevents browning and leads to steaming. Always pat raw prawns dry with paper towels before seasoning.
- **Crowding the pan:** Adding too many prawns to a hot pan lowers the temperature and causes them to release liquid. Cook in batches if necessary to ensure each prawn gets direct contact with the heat.
- **Using low heat:** Prawns need high heat for a short time. Low heat causes them to release their juices and become tough before they have a chance to brown.
- **Over-seasoning:** Prawns have a naturally sweet and delicate flavor. Heavy spice rubs or sauces can easily overwhelm them. Keep seasoning simple and let the prawn shine.

## SEASONING AND FLAVOR PAIRINGS
