- **Aortic Valve:** At the entrance of the aorta.

Other Important Structures

- **Septum:** The muscular wall dividing the left and right sides of the heart.
- **Papillary Muscles & Chordae Tendineae:** Structures that support the atrioventricular valves during contraction.
- **Pericardium:** The protective outer sac (sometimes included on advanced worksheets).
