The story resolves with a happy ending: the couple overcomes their demons and builds a family, achieving a conventional happily-ever-after despite the unconventional path.

MAIN CHARACTERS AND THEIR DYNAMICS

Anastasia "Ana" Steele

Ana is the quintessential "everywoman" protagonist. She is intelligent, yet insecure; curious, yet naive. Throughout the trilogy, she evolves from a submissive partner in the BDSM dynamic to an equal partner in love and business. Christian Grey
