wireless network controller, a faulty chipset can cause the Wi-Fi card to be undetected or to disconnect randomly.

Connect the motherboard to a lab power supply set to the laptop's standby voltage (typically 19V for modern laptops). Do not press the power button yet. Measure the standby voltages (3.3V and 5V always on). If these are present, proceed to measure the chipset's standby rail (often 1.05V or 1.8V). If this rail is missing, the chipset will not wake up. Next, press the power button and observe the power sequencing. Different models have specific sequences, but a common one is:

1. Main power (19V) →
2. Standby rails (3.3V, 5V) →
3. PCH/EC power (1.05V, 1.8V) →
4. CPU voltage (Vcore) →
5. System reset (PLTRST#) →
6. BIOS activity (SPI signals).

## Schematics

To proceed further, you must know exactly which chipset you are dealing with. Look for markings such as "SRK0B" (Intel PCH) or "218-0620037" (AMD FCH).
