The deluxe editions include a documentary titled *The End: A Journey*, which provides a behind-the-scenes look at the making of the 13 album and the tour. This documentary is a valuable companion piece, offering honest interviews about the band's dynamic, the health scares, and the emotional weight of saying goodbye.

The Legacy: A Final Word from the Masters
