Grains: The Foundation of the Plan

Whole grains play a starring role in the DASH diet. You are encouraged to consume six to eight servings per day. A serving is considered one slice of whole-wheat bread, one ounce of dry cereal, or half a cup of cooked rice, pasta, or cereal. Prioritizing whole grains over refined grains is crucial because they contain more fiber, which helps regulate blood pressure and supports heart health. Opt for oatmeal, brown rice, quinoa, whole-wheat pasta, and whole-grain bread.

Vegetables: A Nutrient Powerhouse

Vegetables are nutrient-dense and low in calories, making them a cornerstone of the DASH approach. You should aim for four to five servings daily. A serving is one cup of raw leafy greens, half a cup of cooked vegetables, or half a cup of vegetable juice. Leafy greens like spinach, kale, and Swiss chard are exceptionally rich in potassium and magnesium. Broccoli, carrots, bell peppers, and tomatoes also contribute significantly to your daily mineral intake. The more colorful your plate, the wider the range of vitamins, minerals, and antioxidants you will consume.

Fruits: Natural Sweetness and Essential Minerals

Fruits provide natural sweetness along with a generous dose of potassium, fiber, and antioxidants. The DASH diet recommends four to five servings of fruit per day. One serving equals one medium piece of fruit, half a cup of fresh, frozen, or canned fruit (in its own juice, not syrup), or half a cup of fruit juice. Bananas, oranges, cantaloupe, honeydew melon, berries, and apricots are particularly high in potassium. Including a variety of fruits ensures you get a broad spectrum of nutrients and keeps your meals interesting.

Dairy: Choose Low-Fat or Fat-Free Options

Dairy products are an excellent source of calcium, a key mineral for blood pressure regulation. The DASH diet recommends two to three servings per day. A serving is one cup of milk or yogurt, or one and a half ounces of cheese. However, it is critically important to choose low-fat or fat-free options to keep saturated fat intake in check. Greek yogurt, skim milk, and part-skim mozzarella are excellent choices. If you are lactose intolerant or follow a vegan diet, fortified plant-based alternatives like soy milk or almond milk can be suitable substitutes, provided they are low in added sugars and enriched with calcium.

Lean Protein: Poultry, Fish, and Plant-Based Options

Protein is essential for overall health, but the DASH diet emphasizes lean sources. You should aim for six or fewer servings of lean meat, poultry, and fish per day. A serving is one ounce of cooked meat, poultry, or fish, or one egg. Fish, especially fatty varieties like salmon, mackerel, and sardines, are rich in omega-3 fatty acids, which support heart health. Poultry should be skinless to reduce fat content. Plant-based protein sources like beans, lentils, and tofu are also encouraged and can be counted toward your protein or nut and seed servings.

Nuts, Seeds, and Legumes: Healthy Fats and Plant Protein

Nuts, seeds, and legumes provide healthy unsaturated fats, protein, and minerals like magnesium and potassium. The DASH diet recommends four to five servings per week. A serving is one-third cup of nuts, two tablespoons of seeds, or half a cup of cooked legumes (beans, lentils, or peas). Walnuts, almonds, flaxseeds, chia seeds, and chickpeas are all excellent choices. These foods are calorie-dense, so portion control is important, but they offer substantial health benefits when consumed in moderation.

Fats and Oils: Choose Unsaturated Sources

Fat is necessary for nutrient absorption and overall health, but the type of fat matters. The DASH diet recommends two to three servings of fats and oils per day. A serving is one teaspoon of vegetable oil (such as olive, canola, or sunflower oil), one tablespoon of mayonnaise, or two tablespoons of salad dressing. Prioritizing unsaturated fats over saturated and trans fats is key. Avocado, olive oil, and nut-based oils are heart-healthy choices. Limiting butter, lard, and tropical oils like coconut and palm oil is advised.

Sweets and Added Sugars: Occasional Treats

One of the most appealing aspects of the DASH diet is that it does not completely eliminate sweets. However, they should be consumed sparingly. The diet recommends no more than five servings per week. A serving is one tablespoon of sugar, jelly, or jam, half a cup of sherbet, or one small cookie or piece of candy. The goal is to satisfy occasional cravings without derailing your overall nutrient intake. Over time, many people find that their taste buds adjust and they crave sweets less frequently.
