Fresh Fish and Seafood

Seafood is notoriously high in histamine, especially if it is not exceptionally fresh. Histamine levels can soar within hours of a fish being caught if it is not properly chilled. For this reason, many people on a low histamine diet avoid fish entirely during the elimination phase.

- **Best Choices:** If you tolerate it, the freshest possible non-oily fish like cod, haddock, or plaice, eaten on the day of purchase. Flash-frozen fish may also be an option as the freezing process can slow histamine formation.
- **What to Avoid:** All canned, smoked, pickled, or dried fish (tuna, salmon, sardines, herring, mackerel). Shellfish like shrimp, lobster, crab, and mussels are almost always problematic.
- **Tip:** Be extremely cautious with fish. Many find it is safer to avoid it completely for the first few weeks and test it later.

Eggs and Dairy

Dairy products can be a mixed bag. While fresh milk and butter are often fine, aged cheeses are some of the highest histamine foods available. Eggs are generally well-tolerated by many, but some individuals react to the egg white.

- **Best Choices:** Fresh pasteurized milk, fresh cream, butter, and ghee. Fresh, unripened cheeses like mozzarella, ricotta, cream cheese, and cottage cheese (in small amounts). Eggs are usually tolerated, but start with the yolk only if you are sensitive.
- **What to Avoid:** All aged, fermented, or ripened cheeses (cheddar, parmesan, gouda, blue cheese, camembert, brie, Swiss, etc.). Yogurt, kefir, buttermilk, and sour cream are fermented and typically high in histamine.
- **Tip:** Many people find they can tolerate a small amount of fresh mozzarella or ricotta. Listen to your body.

Vegetables

Fresh vegetables are the cornerstone of a low histamine diet. Most are naturally low in histamine, with a few notable exceptions. The key is to eat them fresh and avoid anything that is pickled, fermented, or overripe.

- **Best Choices:** All fresh leafy greens (lettuce, arugula, spinach), broccoli, cauliflower, zucchini, cucumber, carrots, sweet potatoes, potatoes, asparagus, green beans, celery, beets, and onions. Garlic and ginger are excellent for flavor and have some natural anti-histamine properties.
- **What to Avoid:** Spinach (some find it high, though it's debated), tomatoes, eggplant,

Fruits

Fresh fruits are generally well-tolerated, but some are natural histamine liberators. Dried fruits are concentrated sources of histamine and should be avoided.

- **Best Choices:** Apples, pears, blueberries, cranberries, mangoes, peaches (in moderation), watermelon, cantaloupe, honeydew melon, and lychee.
- **What to Avoid:** Citrus fruits (oranges, lemons, limes, grapefruit), bananas, strawberries, raspberries, pineapple, papaya, and all dried fruits (raisins, dates, figs, apricots). Fruit juices, especially citrus, are also problematic.
- **Tip:** Fresh berries like blueberries and cranberries are generally very safe. Stick to these for your antioxidant fix.

Grains and Cereals

Most plain, unprocessed grains are low in histamine. However, yeasted breads and fermented grains can be problematic. Many people with histamine intolerance also have issues with gluten, though it is not always a direct histamine issue.

- **Best Choices:** White rice, brown rice, quinoa, oats (certified gluten-free), millet, and buckwheat. Gluten-free pasta and breads (in moderation) made from these grains. Corn and cornmeal are generally fine.
- **What to Avoid:** Sourdough bread, yeasted bread (especially if not fresh), and any grain-based products that are fermented. Freshly baked bread is preferable.
- **Tip:** Cook grains fresh each day. Leftover cooked grains can be high in histamine.

Nuts, Seeds, and Legumes

Legumes are a common source of protein, but many are histamine liberators. Nuts and seeds can be tolerated by some but not others. Freshness is again a key factor.

- **Best Choices:** Macadamia nuts, pecans, coconut, flaxseeds, chia seeds, pumpkin seeds, and sunflower seeds. Lentils and chickpeas (cooked from dried) are sometimes tolerated by some people.
- **What to Avoid:** Peanuts, walnuts, cashews, almonds, pistachios, and soybeans (tofu, edamame, soy sauce). All beans (kidney, black, pinto) are often problematic. Peanut butter and other nut butters are usually high in histamine.
- **Tip:** If you tolerate them, eat nuts and seeds raw and fresh. Roasting can increase histamine levels.

Herbs, Spices, and Flavorings

Many spices are histamine liberators. A simple approach with a few well-tolerated herbs is best, especially during the elimination phase.

- **Best Choices:** Fresh basil, oregano, parsley, cilantro, rosemary, thyme, sage, chives, garlic, ginger, and turmeric. Salt is safe. Small amounts of black pepper are usually tolerated.
- **What to Avoid:** All dried spices (especially chili powder, cumin, cinnamon, cloves, and curry powder), vinegar (all types), soy sauce, tamari, miso, and any spice blends. Cayenne pepper and paprika are histamine liberators.
- **Tip:** Use fresh herbs generously. They add flavor without the histamine risk of dried versions.

Beverages

Beverages are a hidden source of dietary histamine. Many common drinks are fermented or aged, making them very high in histamine.

- **Best Choices:** Fresh water, herbal teas (chamomile, ginger, peppermint, rooibos), and fresh vegetable juices (carrot, celery, cucumber). Coconut water is generally safe.
- **What to Avoid:** All alcohol (beer, wine, spirits), coffee, black tea, green tea, energy drinks, soda, and kombucha. Fruit juices, especially citrus, are also best avoided.
- **Tip:** Drink plenty of water throughout the day. It helps flush histamine from your system.

Fats and Oils

Pure fats and oils are generally low in histamine, but some processed oils can be inflammatory.

- **Best Choices:** Olive oil, coconut oil, ghee, butter, and avocado oil (if you tolerate avocado).
- **What to Avoid:** Vegetable oils (soybean, corn, sunflower, canola), margarine, and any oil that is rancid or old. Lard and rendered animal fats can be problematic if not fresh.
- **Tip:** Store oils in a cool, dark place to prevent rancidity.
