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DISCOVERING THE TIME WARNER CINCINNATI CHANNEL GUIDE: YOUR COMPLETE VIEWING COMPANION

For decades, Time Warner Cable was the dominant provider of television and internet services in Cincinnati, offering residents a broad range of programming from local news and sports to premium entertainment. Even

though the brand has since been acquired by Spectrum, many households still refer to their channel lineup as the Time Warner Cincinnati channel guide. Whether you are a long-time subscriber using legacy equipment or a new Spectrum user trying to locate your favorite channels, understanding the structure of the former Time Warner lineup in the Queen City is essential. This guide breaks down everything you need to know about the Time

Warner Cincinnati channel guide, including key channel numbers, popular categories, sports options, and tips to navigate your remote like a pro. We will focus on the classic channel assignments that many Cincinnati viewers have memorized, while also acknowledging the transition to Spectrum's updated numbering system. Read on to become an expert on your local television options.

UNDERSTANDING THE TIME WARNER CINCINNATI CHANNEL GUIDE

A Brief History of

Cable in Cincinnati

The Time Warner Cincinnati channel guide dates back to a time when the company was the primary cable provider for most of Hamilton County and surrounding areas. Local programming, such as ABC, CBS, NBC, and Fox affiliates, were assigned easily remembered two-digit numbers, while specialty channels like ESPN, CNN, and Discovery occupied the 20s, 30s, and 40s. After Charter Communications merged with Time Warner Cable in 2016, the brand slowly shifted to Spectrum. However, many customers still have

the familiar channel map stored in their cable boxes or their memory. Even today, Spectrum offers a “legacy” channel lineup option that mirrors the old Time Warner Cincinnati channel guide for those who prefer consistency.

How the Guide Is Organized

Classic Time Warner guides in Cincinnati grouped channels by category. Lower numbers (2 through 19) usually carried local broadcast stations and public access. The 20s and 30s featured basic

cable networks like TBS, TNT, USA Network, and local sports coverage. Premium channels such as HBO, Showtime, and Cinemax were found in the 200s or higher. The digital tier occupied numbers above 100, including HD versions of popular networks. Understanding this layout helps you quickly locate content whether you are browsing through a printed guide, an on-screen menu, or the Spectrum app that replaced the old Time Warner guide interface.

KEY CHANNEL CATEGORIES AND HIGHLIGHTS

Local

Broadcast Stations

Cincinnati viewers rely on local channels for news, syndicated shows, and major network programming. In the traditional Time Warner Cincinnati channel guide, the following numbers were standard:

- **Channel 5 (WLWT)** – NBC affiliate
- **Channel 9 (WCPO)** – ABC affiliate
- **Channel 12 (WKRC)** – CBS affiliate
- **Channel 19 (WXIX)** – Fox affiliate
- **Channel 14 (WCET)** – PBS
- **Channel 25 (WSTR)** –

MyNetworkTV/CW

These channels were always the backbone of the lineup and remain easily accessible even after the Spectrum transition.

News and Weather

Cincinnati is a news-hungry market, and Time Warner provided dedicated channels for local updates.

Spectrum News 1 (formerly Time Warner Cable News) appeared on channel 1 or 9 depending on the package. For national news, CNN (channel 26), Fox News (channel 28), and MSNBC (channel 30) were standard in basic tier packages. The Weather Channel occupied

channel 32, though many viewers preferred local radar on the interactive guide.

Entertainment and Lifestyle

The core of the Time Warner Cincinnati channel guide revolved around general entertainment networks. Popular channels included:

- **Channel 2 (WEWS)** – sometimes available from Cleveland but replaced by local HD feeds
- **Channel 17 (TBS)** – classic sitcoms and movies
- **Channel 18**

(TNT) – dramas and basketball

- **Channel 22 (USA Network)** – original series and WWE
- **Channel 24 (FX)** – edgy programming
- **Channel 27 (Comedy Central)** – stand-up and south park
- **Channel 29 (Discovery Channel)** – non-fiction and adventure
- **Channel 31 (TLC)** – reality and lifestyle
- **Channel 33 (A&E)** – true crime and documentaries

These numbers may vary slightly depending on whether you had basic, expanded basic, or digital packages.

NAVIGATING YOUR CHANNEL LINEUP

Using the On-Screen Guide

The Time Warner Cincinnati channel guide on your television screen was accessible by pressing the “Guide” button on your remote. This interactive menu allowed you to scroll through all channels in real time, see program descriptions, and search by genre. Today, Spectrum’s guide has a similar feel but with a different color scheme. If you miss the old interface, you can still use the

channel up/down features to browse sequentially. For HD channels, simply add a prefix (often 700 or 800) to the standard number. For example, ESPN HD was channel 727, while Fox Sports Ohio HD was channel 732.

Printed Lineup Cards

For years, Time Warner mailed tri-fold channel lineup cards to Cincinnati customers. These cards listed every channel number by category. If you kept an old card from 2015 or 2016, it remains largely accurate for basic service, though Spectrum has changed

a few numbers. You can also download a PDF version from the Spectrum website under “Channel Lineup” – simply input your Cincinnati ZIP code to see the current iteration of the legacy Time Warner Cincinnati channel guide.

POPULAR CHANNELS AND THEIR NUMBERS

Below is a summarized list of frequently searched channels from the Time Warner Cincinnati channel guide. Please note that these are the classic assignments; your current Spectrum box may have updated numbers.

- **ESPN:** Channel 26 (SD), Channel 726 (HD)
- **Fox Sports Ohio:** Channel 30 (SD), Channel 730 (HD)
- **HBO:** Channel 200 (SD) – multiple HBO channels in 200-210 range
- **Showtime:** Channel 215 (SD)
- **Cinemax:** Channel 230 (SD)
- **Disney Channel:** Channel 40 (SD), Channel 740 (HD)
- **Nickelodeon:** Channel 41 (SD)
- **Cartoon Network:** Channel 43 (SD)
- **HGTV:** Channel 45 (SD)
- **Food Network:** Channel 46 (SD)
- **Bravo:** Channel 50 (SD)
- **AMC:** Channel 55 (SD)
- **History Channel:** Channel 57 (SD)

- **National Geographic:**
Channel 59 (SD)
- **PBS Kids:**
Channel 14 or 101 depending on package

For sports fans, the Time Warner Cincinnati channel guide also offered college sports networks like ESPNU (channel 38) and Big Ten Network (channel 35). The NFL Network was typically on channel 34, and MLB Network on channel 36.

PACKAGES AND CUSTOMIZATION

Basic, Expanded

Basic, and Digital Tiers

Time Warner offered three primary levels of service in Cincinnati. The **Basic Tier** included local broadcast channels, public access, and a few cable networks like CNN and TBS. The **Expanded Basic Tier** added popular entertainment, news, sports, and kids' channels. The **Digital Tier** unlocked HD versions, premium channels, music stations, and on-demand content. Most households subscribed to Expanded Basic plus a digital upgrade. The

Time Warner Cincinnati channel guide gave each tier its own range of numbers, but the core channels (2-60) were common across all packages.

Add-On Packs

You could customize your lineup with “Sports Pass” (NFL RedZone, NHL Network, Fox Soccer Plus), “Movie Pass” (more premium movie channels), or “International Pass” (foreign language channels). These added channels appeared in the 300, 400, and 500 ranges respectively. The guide still listed them under the main channel list, but with a lock icon if you had not subscribed.

SPORTS PROGRAMMING IN CINCINNATI

Local Teams Coverage

Cincinnati is passionate about its sports teams. The Time Warner Cincinnati channel guide gave priority to **Fox Sports Ohio** (now Bally Sports Ohio) for Reds baseball and Cavaliers/Blue Jackets coverage. For Bengals NFL games, the main networks (CBS, Fox, NBC) handled the majority of broadcasts. Thursday and Sunday night games appeared on NFL Network (channel 34) or ESPN (channel 26). College sports, especially University of Cincinnati

Bearcats, Xavier Musketeers, and Ohio State Buckeyes, were widely available on ESPN, Fox Sports Ohio, and local over-the-air stations.

HD HIGH-DEFINITION Sports Viewing

Sports looked best in high definition. In the legacy Time Warner Cincinnati channel guide, HD sports channels were often found in the 700s. For example, Fox Sports

Ohio HD was channel 730, ESPN HD was 726, and NFL Network HD was 734. If you had a digital box, you could set your guide to show only HD channels to avoid duplicates.
