- **Physical Ability Test (PAT):** This is a timed course that simulates the physical demands of the job, including lifting, carrying, and walking with heavy loads.
- **Background investigation:** You will be screened for criminal history, driving record, and residency requirements.
- **Medical and drug screening:** You must pass a physical exam and a drug test before being appointed.

Because the list can remain active for up to four years, candidates who scored high on the written exam but do not get called immediately may still be considered later.
