Option B is the correct answer. Respiratory distress with impending failure is a life threat in pediatric trauma. The nurse must first secure the airway. While cervical immobilization is important, the ABCs

take precedence.

Question 3: A patient with a pelvic fracture is hypotensive and does not respond to initial fluid resuscitation. Which of the following is the most likely cause?

- A. Cardiac tamponade
- B. Neurogenic shock
- C. Ongoing hemorrhage into the pelvic cavity
- D. Tension pneumothorax

Answer & Rationale:

Option C. Pelvic fractures can cause massive retroperitoneal bleeding. In the setting of trauma and hypotension unresponsive to fluids, hemorrhage control is critical – often requiring pelvic binding, angioembolization, or preperitoneal packing.

Common Pitfalls When Studying TNCC Test Questions
