The 1934 Black and White Film

This early sound adaptation starred the beautiful **Dawn O'Day** as Anne. In a fascinating piece of cinematic history, O'Day so fully embraced the role that she legally changed her name to **Anne Shirley**. This film offers a glimpse into how the story was first interpreted for the screen, though it is often criticized for having a much older and more polished Anne than the book describes. The cast also included Helen Jerome Eddy as a kindly Marilla and O.P. Heggie as a sweet Matthew.

Other Notable Adaptations
