For classrooms or kids' activities, use the template as a coloring page. Then cut out the shapes and glue them onto a backing sheet, leaving black lines drawn with marker between sections. This "paper" stained glass can be taped to a sunny window to create a bright, colorful effect. It is also an excellent way to recycle old craft supplies.

DIY PROJECT: MAKING A FAUX STAINED GLASS STAR USING A TEMPLATE

wreath of holly. The key is having a clearly defined template to guide your paint.
