The Superficial Front Line (SFL)

The SFL is responsible for lifting the front of the body and creating flexion. A short SFL can manifest as a "chest-out" posture, anterior pelvic tilt, and ankle dorsiflexion limitation. Balancing the SFL and SBL is fundamental to good posture.

The Lateral Line (LL)

The Lateral Line runs along both sides of the body, from the ankle, up the fibula,

through the iliotibial band (IT band), and along the lateral trunk muscles to the skull. It is crucial for creating side-bending, stabilizing the trunk during walking, and balancing the body in the frontal plane. A common issue here is tightness in the IT band or quadratus lumborum, which can lead to hip imbalances and scoliotic patterns. The Lateral Line perfectly illustrates how a problem in one area, like a "bad hip," might be a function of the entire lateral chain.

The Spiral Line (SL)

The Spiral Line is a fascinating and complex meridian that wraps around the body in a helix. It connects one side of the skull to the opposite side of the shoulder, then crosses to the opposite hip, and down the leg to the foot. Its role is to create and modulate rotational movements. This line is essential for walking, throwing, and any activity involving trunk rotation. When the Spiral Line is compromised, it can lead to compensations throughout the body, affecting everything from shoulder mechanics to gait efficiency.

The Arm Lines and Deep Front Line

Beyond these four primary lines, **Anatomy Trains By Thomas Myers** also maps the four Arm Lines (Superficial and Deep Front and Back Arm Lines) that connect the trunk to the hands, and

the Deep Front Line (DFL). The DFL is arguably the most important and complex of all the lines. It runs deep within the body, supporting the core, the spine, and the inner organs.
